Background

- Continuous Renal Replacement Therapy (CRRT) in this organization was a specialized nursing skill with less than 40 nurses trained each year
- Increasing nurse attrition in all seven critical care units negatively impacted CRRT nurse staffing, prompting an organizational mandate of largescale CRRT training for all critical care nurses
- Expansion of the CRRT workforce led to a gap in communication regarding CRRT-specific practices

Purpose

To identify and implement an effective communication approach for CRRT related updates

Methods

Practice Update Flyers

- Developed from CRRT nurse queries, as well as Clinical Nurse Specialist and Physician discussions
- Highlighted CRRT changes, practice concerns, and improvement opportunities
- Distributed to critical care units, shared in unit huddles, emailed to staff, and posted on units

CRRT Fair


- Coordinated/hosted by CRRT Council
- Learning methods included game-based learning, hands-on demonstrations, and open discussions

Description and Outcomes

- Traditional informal approaches to communication with a small group were less effective when attempted with the larger group
- CRRT nurses needed consistent and reliable information easily, be it through practice update flyers, emails, or learning events

The CRRT Fair was attended by 109 CRRT RNs with 100% participating in all activities.

Evaluation

 Gaps in communication could lead to practice errors and non-traditional strategies may be effective in improving communication

Implications

- Growing CRRT programs should explore ways to effectively communicate practice changes
- Nurses may perform CRRT more efficiently with easily accessible information



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
